# Play a Hand with me

I will call this the "eight ever, nine sometimes" hand. This hand came up in the recent Instant Matchpoint Game" The hands have been rotated to show south the declarer. My right hand opponent opened one diamond, I overcalled one spade and my partner raised so I bid game. The opening lead was the 9 of diamonds to the A and the 5 of diamonds came back when I thought that my left hand opponent was going to trump this. Much to my surprise, they followed with the 4. At this point the hand is an open book which doesn't happen very often.

After winning the second diamond I led a spade to the A and a spade back to the J and drew the last trump and claimed. How did I know to do this? When someone opens a diamond and shows up with three, they must have 3 spades at least. I believe that when you open 1 diamond you should have 4 of them and with 3 diamonds and 3 clubs you open 1 club (partner usually doesn't lead or raise clubs). Yes, I know that with Axx, xxxx, AKQ, xxx you best open 1 D.

Larry Cohen in his analysis discusses that had they opened 1 club and a club was led and if there was a misguess in spades declarer could have trouble which is true, but he doesn't discuss how this hand makes 6 after a diamond is opened and a diamond is led. He just states that double dummy 12 tricks are available. Well, it was unlucky for my opponent to paint a clear path to making 6 for 90%.

### IMPROVE YOUR BRIDGE PLAY

#### IMPROVE YOUR BRIDGE PLAY

TWO-LEVEL OVERCALLS (Part 1)

Reference: Mike Lawrence, "The Complete Book on Overcalls," 1979

Two-level overcalls require a good hand and a good suit. A hand can qualify as "good" due to either strength (usually at least 12 HCP) or distribution to make up for less HCP.

#### Not Vulnerable

Your RHO opens 1S, and you hold the following hands:

- 1 S 106 H AQJ96 D A1042 C Q3
- 2 S 3 H A3 D 10542 C KQJ763
- 3 S 10652 H AQ10963 D K3 C 5
- 4 S 872 H AJ10863 D K3 C 54
- 1 Bid 2H. Game is not likely, but there's a good chance for a part score.
- 2 Bid 2C. Straight forward. Only 10 HCP, but good distribution.
- 3 Bid 2H. With 4 cards in opener's suit and only 9 HCP this is still a solid overcall. It's likely that partner is short in spades, and with heart support there is a good play for 3 hearts. The suit is certainly good, and the hand qualifies as "good" because of the excellent distribution.
- 4 Pass or Bid 2H. This hand is similar to the last one except there is one less spade and a slightly less strong suit. At matchpoints 2H creates some problems for opponents and might work, but at IMP scoring or Rubber Bridge it is a Pass.

#### **Vulnerable**

At matchpoint scoring taking a big loss on a hand costs just one bad result. A bottom board is a zero no matter how big the minus score. But, when playing Rubber Bridge or IMP scoring, going for a large loss on a hand can be much more costly. When vulnerable at IMP or Rubber scoring, one should be more cautious with two level overcalls.

RHO opens 1S and you hold:

1 S K1073 H 3 D KQ982 C K54

2 S 73 H K2 D AQ10872 C AK7

3 S 63 H K2 D KQ8654 C AJ

4 S 10762 H AQ10963 D K4 C 2

5 S QJ3 H KJ872 D A43 C QJ

- 1 Bid 2D but only at matchpoints. If not vulnerable, this is a clear 2D, but, vulnerable and playing IMP scoring or rubber bridge, there are risks.
- 2 This is a clear 2D overcall vulnerable at either matchpoints or IMPS.
- 3 Hands 2. and 3. illustrate the difference between playing matchpoints and IMPs. Both hands merit an overcall of 2D at matchpoints vulnerable, but at IMPs or Rubber Bridge it's advisable to pass Hand 3. Hand 2 has game potential, but Hand 3 does not, and it is not safe.
- 4 Bid 2H. Good vulnerable overcall. Having four spades, the distribution makes up for lack of HCP.
- 5 Pass. A trap for point counters. The suit is bad, distribution is poor and the hand has wasted points.
